Item 7 Other Business Appointment of a Gallery One Public Officer.

Due to COVID requirements Gallery 1 was closed for 7 weeks. During that time, it became necessary for the Gallery to qualify for JobSeeker and Federal Government COVID stimulus initiatives. This required lengthy complicated discussions with Australian Tax Office (ATO) complicated by a lack of a recognised Public Officer. Fortunately, the discussions were successful and consequently, the Gallery secured some Federal funding.

AS we were unable to identify the Association's Public Officer, the ATO suggested the appointment of a new Public Officer which would improve our communication procedures in the future.

The appointee acting on behalf of the Gallery, would be a single point of contact when conducting business and financial related discussions.

Gallery 1 Executive Committee unanimously agreed to this and resolved The Chair, David Milne be nominated for the position of Public Officer and he was duly appointed.

As Public Officer David can appoint another Officer to conduct the business of the Gallery with the ATO and since the Treasurer had had conduct of the matter so far he is the obvious choice and Gavin was willing to accept.

REPORT OF CHAIR DAVID MILNE

I commenced my report last year with "What a year this has been!" We seem to be heading back to familiar territory with the impact of the Covid pandemic omnipresent. Since re-opening under lockdowns we continued to operate under various Covid Recovery Plans which constantly changed and placed restrictions on the number of people the Gallery could host. Whilst the Gallery remained open for classes it was necessary to wipe down surfaces between classes and of course for students and visitors to register, sanitize and socially distance when they attended the Gallery. These remain requirements and will probably do so for a period of time

In February 2021 we were pleased to receive a visit from the SA Governor His Excellency The Honourable Hieu van Le AC and his wife during a Tuesday Hooked on Tuesday class. They showed great interest in the work of the ladies.

Exhibitions

As an Art Gallery we like to see our walls adorned with artworks, to promote artists and hopefully provide opportunities for them to record sales.

One of our first events was the 2020 SALA Exhibition "Timology" curated by Gerard Mignot. Unfortunately due to restrictions we could not hold an opening for this Exhibition so the collection was available online as well as in the Gallery. There were four sales from this exhibition. As history would have it the same fate befell the 2021 SALA Exhibition with the opening night having to be cancelled.

We were pleased to host the Unley High School Year 12 students Exhibition between 4 and 11 November 2020 closely followed by the return of the Pheonix Exhibition again featuring artworks of Unley High School Year 11 students. Due to restrictions on numbers we had to have staggered and duplicate the opening sessions with a 6 pm followed by a 7 pm opening. Registration of attendees for the time slots were required by both the Education Department and Covid Recovery Plan. The student's works were again of a high standard and the music provided by the students was exceptional. We understand that Unley High was delighted with the evening and we welcome the opportunity to host them again in the future.

The Exhibition calendar concluded with the annual Students, Members Exhibition between 27 November and 11 December. Due to the impact of Covid on business it was determined not to seek donations of prizes on this occasion so no prizes were given. However, pleasingly there were five sales.

The 2021 calendar year began with an impromptu Life Drawing Group exhibition "Bare Essentials" which ran until 19 March 2021 and attracted one sale. This exhibition was on display when the Governor of South Australia visited.

The re-scheduled Life at Death Exhibition "Requiem" curated by Dieter Engler ran between 26 March and 8 April 2021. The Artist in Residence, sponsored by Alfred James Funerals, was chef Sam Prance-Smith who to the enjoyment of those attending demonstrated his art with a Kingfish using the light table. Exhibitors were not required to pay a registration fee due to the generosity of the Uniting Church Mitcham Op-shop who sponsored the registrations. There was one sale.

A Blue Ribbon Exhibition was held between 30 April and 21 May 2021 featuring winners and commended artists from the 2019 Mitcham Art Prize. It was my pleasure at the opening to present the artists Nicola Neutze, Joei Cole, Diana Bradshaw and Gerry Hall. Unfortunately Geoff Weaver was unable to attend on the evening. The samples of their works spread throughout the Gallery, Atrium and East Wing. There were two sales.

May 28 2021 saw the fabulous opening of the long awaited Indigenous Exhibition "The First Stories" curated by Wende Dahl and myself. Originally scheduled for May 2020 this showing was one of the Covid casualties, however nothing was lost as we had a fantastic exhibition despite a poor attendance on opening night. Guests were treated with a 'Welcome to Country' and Smoking Ceremony by local Kuarna elder Uncle Tamaru. Rowena Brown officially opened the Exhibition and gave some insight into the 70 plus artworks on display. The Opening ceremony was subsidised by a grant from Mitcham City Council as were the workshops held during June. The Exhibition ran from 28 May until early July. There were 14 sales from this exhibition and by arrangement with Glenelg Art Gallery we have retained some pieces of art to hang as opportunities arise, some of these pieces were not part of the exhibition

Classes

Fortunately we were able to continue with classes, which remains the prime source of income for the Gallery, through much of the year. We have been fortunate in being able to continue and even grow the number of classes offered during the past year. Attendances have tended to fluctuate but largely we have maintained adequate interest from the community. The Thursday evening Portrait group unfortunately did not survive, but new classes like the Monday Open Studio,

Writing for Beginners and Advanced Writing Group with Gill Preston and a Twighlight Art Class with Gerard Mignot were added to the calendar. Despite Lorraine Brown deciding not to proceed beyond term 2, a number of her students expressed a wish to continue and they now receive guest tutors (for which they pay) once per month and that appears to be working well.

Workshops and Events

Due to various restrictions here and interstate it was decided that rather than hold a 'Twisted Yarn' festival weekend, we would give some of the Gallery space over to a 'Pop Up' shop during September 2020. It was great to see tables laden with various wares, colourful hand-made garments, buttons, and needle work supplies and the ever popular home-made jams – which fortunately we continue to see through the Gallery shop. This proved successful and the Gallery made about \$1100 in commission. Thank you to all who participated.

Funded by a community grant 'Make from Natural Ingredients' 5 workshops were successfully conducted over several months and Meryl Wilkinson and Sanya donated their tutor's fee to the Gallery. In May to coincide with History Week we planned a knitting socks workshops using patterns from circa WWII and mentored by Lianne Gould

During June 2021 we provided 3 workshops "Afternoon with Aunties" with an indigenous artist Julianne Nungarrayi Turner demonstrating dot point techniques. Registrants were provided with boards, paints, utensils and a snack and were able to keep the work they produced. This was a popular and fully attended series of workshops with excellent feedback.

Robert Zunic offered a "How to photograph your artwork to present it online" workshop and created a short video for participants, Robert donated the fees for the Workshop to the Gallery. Thank you Robert.

Music Nights

A Gallery initiative was to hold music nights on a Friday evening to support local musicians and raise the profile of the Gallery within the community. Tickets are \$10 per person with 75% of ticket sales going to the performers. The first and very popular event was held on Friday 19 March 2021 when we were entertained by Les Gitans Blancs (White Gypsies) playing gypsy jazz style music featuring works by Django Reinhardt and others. The music night held on 23 April 2021 was an evening of "improv jazz' featuring Chris Martin, Derek Pascoe and John Aue another terrific evening. On 21 May we were entertained by the 'Jam Toasties' playing 80s themes which by the end of the evening had folk dancing in the aisles. June 25 featured soloist Claire Oremland putting her cello through its paces with some lovely mellow sounds and a varied program of classical and popular pieces. We were fortunate to obtain a liquor licence so guests could enjoy a glass whilst appreciating the sounds of terrific musicianship.

Thank you to all the musicians willing to participate and to the audiences who discovered another aspect to the friendliest little Gallery in town.

We strive to continue to make improvements to the Gallery. We have a wonderful newly designed website. The office has a new height adjustable table, a new chair and thanks to a Mitcham Council grant a new laptop. We also bought a new glass display cabinet for the shop. We were unsuccessful in obtaining a grant to fund the upgrade to the Gallery lighting, so the Management Committee decided to proceed anyway

and that has now been ordered. The Gallery looks fresh having been re-painted, we have new colourful flags to promote our location

The new Logo competition closing date was extended to 10 October 2020. We received 10 submissions of which 2 designs, coincidentally by the same person, were shortlisted. At subsequent meetings the final design was selected although the Committee decided to modify the colour palate to better represent the idea of colour experienced within the Gallery. David Brown won the \$500 prize for the competition.

The effect of Covid upon the finances of the Gallery were ameliorated with the receipt of Jobkeeper payments to December 2020 plus a further stimulus payment. The Management Committee resolved to invest the stimulus payments as a precaution against future lockdowns. The Gallery's finances remain strong under the stewardship of Treasurer Gavin Dennien and I appreciate his patience in dealing with the ATO.

I thank all the Committee Members for their support and ongoing contributions to the success of the Gallery. We are fortunate to have such dedicated people to volunteer here at the Gallery. Thanks to Anna-Maria Zupancic for stepping in as Secretary following Marie Triebilcock's retirement after years of service as Secretary. Finally, but not lastly, to our Gallery Co-ordinator Sanya Zunic whose contribution to this Gallery far exceeds our expectations. Whilst we might not always agree on things she provides a different perspective, especially if she thinks it is "pretty"! Sanya is a selfless and dedicated employee for which this Gallery is extremely appreciative. THANK YOU SANYA.

Accounting Policy Notes Financial year ending 30 June 2021

These accounts have been prepared on an accrual basis with adjustment made for identified income and expenses relating to subsequent accounting periods.

Accounts are prepared using a MYOB Accounting package. Sales continue to be receipted in Xcel and then recorded in MYOB.

Current Liabilities relate to Income received in Advance of anticipated expenditure, Payroll related Accruals, Provision for Covid Stimulus Funds received and some trade creditors. Depreciation is accounted for in the accounts using Xcel with General Journals into MYOB.

Depreciation is charged on Gallery equipment and computers at 33%, Gallery furniture at 15% and Office equipment at 20%.

The Association is not registered for GST therefore it has not been possible to claim a credit for GST paid.

Provision for Annual, Sick and Long Service Leave has been made as our only employee is now a permanent part time employee and has reached provision status for the accrual of Long Service Leave.

A new provision for COVID Stimulus funds received has been established in the accounts.

Apart from normal trading terms the Association does not have any other Liabilities.

Financial Report for the year ended 30 June 2021

I submit the Financial Report comprising the Income and Expenditure Statement for the 2020/21

Financial Year and the Statement of Position as at 30 June 2021 and Notes to the Accounts.

Term Deposits have been added to during the year mainly due to Covid Stimulus funds received. Term Deposits total \$50.090 as at balance date.

As at balance date our working bank account had a balance of \$26,940 slightly up on last year.

The Gallery received a further COVID stimulus of \$7,504, which was added to the existing Provision which is intended to be applied against any future business interruption. This money has been invested in a Term Deposit.

Our overall financial position remains healthy with Current Assets of \$78,391 and depreciated Non-current

Assets of \$3,815 with total Liabilities of \$30,018 with resulting Net Assets of \$52,188.

We continued to receive a reducing JobKeeper funding up until Dec 2020.

With the Covid effect on our classes and exhibitions, we have done well with some provision still available for any further unknown interuption to our services to the community.

Class fees continue to be the prime source of income to the Association although they are down from last year due to COVID closure. Expenses are higher mainly due the the additional salary payments under Jobkeeper,the creation of the Covid Stimulus provision and Provision for Payroll Entitlements.

COORDONATOR'S REPORT

INTRODUCTION

Mitcham Village Art and Crafts Association Inc. (since 1974), trading as Gallery One, is an independent and not for profit community art gallery and teaching studio. Gallery One practice is in the area of community arts and cultural development, supporting collaboration between professional artists/craftspeople and art workers with a local community. Professional artists are employed to facilitate the community's creative process where project participants are empowered to experience artistic practice and express their identity, resulting in cultural development outcomes. Funding for the organisation comes from income generated through art and craft education and exhibitions as well as membership, donations, fundraisers, and project grants.

LIFE DRAWING GROUP

Gallery One offered to the community 20 art and craft classes and groups during 2020/21. Due to available space and particular style of education, ideal Gallery One's group/class is small and consists of 8 to 10 attendees. Gallery One, with class fees based on the number of attendees rather than on hourly rate, continues to support and help the community to form and develop a variety of art/craft groups. Gallery One's educational program provides a platform for lifelong learning, skills development, community participation, engagement, and community mental wellbeing. Service to the local community and cultural development are the main aims of the organisation. Additionally, organisation provides employment opportunities for professional artists and art workers which is another important aspect of the

community arts and cultural development framework.

In sync with current trends and ever on the forefront, Gallery One offered to the local community workshops addressing computer literacy, ecology as well as cultural understanding. Supported by The City of Mitcham Community Development Grants, Gallery organised a series, titled "Make from Natural Ingredients", of five ecology DIY type workshops. "Afternoon with Aunties", a series of three workshops. tutored by indigenous artist Julianne Nungarrayi Turner contributed to a better cultural understanding through dot painting art sessions. "Photograph and prepare your artwork for an online exhibition" provided artists with the tool essential for current times and the future.

In 2020/21 Gallery One was operating

under different and ever changing conditions. However, we still organised a popup shop to replace the Twisted festival, as well as eight art exhibitions. The exhibition program included our yearly SALA, "Blue Ribbon" and Gallery One Students' and Members' exhibitions. It was good to see our Life Drawing group's artists coming together and showing their works in "The Bare Essentials". Gallery's good relationships with different community groups resulted in exhibitions:

"Life @ Death: Requiem" with Uniting Church of Mitcham, Dieter Engler, and chef Sam Prance Smith, again addressed some of the essential life questions and provided a platform for contemplation and open discussion; The First Stories" with Glenelg Art Gallery and Rowena Brown provided a platform for better understanding and appreciation of Australian Indigenous art and culture.

"Phoenix" as well as the Y 12 Art exhibition with Unley High School showcased works by local young people who are considering choosing art as their life path.

Due to circumstances, quite a few exhibitions did not have opening nights and several exhibitions also featured online, with individual exhibitions' websites. It is anticipated that in the future majority of our exhibitions will be presented online.

Euterpe has been silent for some time now. Gallery One decided to support Adelaide musicians, so music performances joined Gallery One's art program this year. In a series of intimate, almost chamber music atmosphere, some of the top Adelaide classical and jazz musicians performed at the gallery. Music Nights at the Gallery will continue to supporting musicians, who, in return, are providing a superb experience for their community.
