## CHAIR'S REPORT

I acknowledge the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 8 September 2022 after a glorious reign of seventy years.

Our "friendly" Gallery has continued to function well despite the continuing shadow of Covid which has impacted operations generally with a lockdown in July affecting members and students accordingly. In January 2022 when we reopened following an extra Management Committee meeting to grapple with the policies for vaccination and mask wearing and the impact on students and users of the Gallery. Sadly during the year we lost Gary Lee-Gaston a long-term Gallery One member who had an Exhibition in the Gallery a few years back and Russell Starke OAM a long-time supporter of the Gallery. Julie Arnott proposed the concept for a Portrait Prize competition. David Smallacombe was approached to sponsor the prize and he generously pledged \$5000 and the M & M Carbins Trust agreed to sponsor a \$1000 youth prize. The Portrait Prize sub-committee (Julie Arnott, Robert Zunic, Philip David, Sanya and myself) set the parameters for the competition which was decided to be a Self-Portrait competition with a closing date of 30 June 2022. During the year the Committee farewelled Wende Dahl a stalwart supporter of the Gallery who made a considerable contribution including three years as President. Wende's contribution was recognised at the opening of the Life@Death exhibition on 11 March 2022. We welcomed Ruth Flaherty to the Committee to fill a casual vacancy.



#### **Classes**

Fortunately we were able to continue with classes, which remains the prime source of income for the Gallery, through much of the year. We have been fortunate in being able to continue and even grow the number classes offered during the past year. Attendances have tended to fluctuate but largely we have maintained adequate interest from the community. The Thursday evening Portrait group unfortunately did not survive, but new classes like the Monday Open Studio, Writing for Beginners with Gill Preston and a Twighlight Art Class with Gerard Mignot were added to the calendar. Despite Lorraine Brown deciding not to proceed beyond term 3, a number of her students expressed a wish to continue and they now have Diana Bradshaw as their fortnightly tutor as well as occasional guest tutors (for which they pay) and that appears to be working well. Cleone Hoyle also discontinued her Monday watercolour classes at the Gallery.

#### **Exhibitions**

As an Art Gallery we like to see our walls adorned with artworks, to promote artists and hopefully provide opportunities for them to record sales.

During the 2021/2 financial year our first event was the 2021 SALA Exhibition "Movement en plein air" curated by Gerard Mignot in July, unfortunately the Opening needed to be cancelled and the duration reduced due to Covid lockdown. A second SALA event, a solo exhibition "Vignettes" featuring the work of Robert Zunic in August was opened by Russel Starke and resulted in 15 sales!

## CHAIR'S REPORT

In October/November the Gallery hosted Exhibitions by Salvador Loreto "From Real to Surreal" and "Bijou" by Dagny Strand a Penola artist. We were pleased to host the Unley High School year 11 students Pheonix Exhibition between 12 -19 November opened by Mitcham Mayor Dr Heather Holmes-Ross. The Exhibition calendar year concluded with the annual Students, Participants and Members Exhibition between 26 November and 9 December with an Award night on 3 December.

The 2022 calendar year opened with "Des Bettany - retrospective of a rich life" Exhibition from 4 February to 5 March. The exhibition included artworks by two of Des's children, son Graham and daughter Ruth Flaherty and included images from Des's time as a POW in Changi. Des was Acting Principal of the SA School of Art - 2 sales. The 10th Life @ Death Exhibition "Still life - dead nature" was held 11 March to 12 April, opened by Deiter Engler and featuring Artist in Residence florist Ruth Rodda who constructed a floral piece as part of the opening on 11 March 2022. The Uniting Church of Mitcham Op Shop sponsored the Artist in Residence and the entry fees for artists - 4 sales .

May 6 2022 saw the opening of the second Indigenous Exhibition "Colours of Country" curated by myself which ran until 3 June. Guests were treated to a Smoking Ceremony sponsored by a Mitcham Council Maggie Regless Memorial Grant and conducted by local Kuarna elder Uncle Tamaru. Rowena Brown officially opened the Exhibition and talked about the stories related to some of the artworks. Unfortunately the opening was poorly attended. Seven works sold.

The year ended with two concurrent but very different exhibitions between 10 June and 8 July. "Jenny Gregson & Students" Exhibition in the Gallery was opened on 10 June by David Baker RSASA President. "Don't Mention Pollock" Exhibition by painter Stephen Jones occupied the Atrium and East Wing and opened on 17 June 2022. Stephen had 5 sales from his first exhibition of abstract work.

#### **Workshops and Events**

A soap making workshop using natural ingredients was held on 9 April 2022 conducted by Meryl Wilkinson.

As part of the Indigenous Exhibition a Mitcham City Council grant sponsored 4 workshops, 2 dot painting and 2 weaving conducted by Auntie Elaine during June 2022.

A significant event was the Gallery One Community for Ukraine suggested by Marie Trebilcock and held on 13 May 2022 with over 60 items donated to be sold by secret auction. The night was a great success and a cheque for \$3,112 was subsequently paid to the Association of Ukranians in SA.

## CHAIR'S REPORT

#### **Music Nights**

A Gallery initiative to hold music nights on a Friday evening to support local musicians and raise the profile of the Gallery within the community continued in September 2021 with Mike Bevan and Alain Velodze on guitars, having been postponed from July. The series concluded in October with Mary Raptis on violin and viola, accompanied on piano by Frances Norton entertained with "From the Bottle to the Beethoven".

With the success of the initial series, Music Nights continued in 2022 with the first event postponed to May when the booked out "Les Gitans Blancs Project" featuring two guitars, double base and keyboard took the audience on another musical journey. June 24 saw the popular return of Mike Bevan and Alain Velodze both guitarists taking us musically to South America and beyond. The second series will continue through to October 2022.

Thank you to all the musicians willing to participate and to the audiences who discovered another aspect to the friendliest little Gallery in town.

#### **Gallery**

We strive to continue to make improvements to the Gallery. Having been unsuccessful in obtaining a grant to fund the installation of lighting for the Gallery the Management Committee resolved to proceed anyway. Installation took longer than anticipated due to supply issues but finally completed in January 2022. Thank you to Paula Furlani for the lighting design and her advice and support, we are delighted with the result (pun intended). The front reception desk has been refurbished with a replacement front panel incorporating the new colourful logo.

Gallery One offered to the community 20 art and craft classes and groups during 2021/22. The majority of our standard classes and groups consist of 8-10, mainly mature, students. Small classes and highly accomplished and experienced artists and crafters as tutors is a great platform for adult learning. Gallery One educational program provides lifelong learning, skills development, and also community participation and engagement. Consequently, through G1 educational program, the community gets involved in our other activities (e.g. exhibitions, events, volunteering) which contributes to better health and well-being of participants, their sense of belonging and purpose as well as their sense of contribution to the community/society. The main aim of the program is community cultural development. However, some of the work created in the process also have a significant level of artistic accomplishment.

Supported by The City of Mitcham Community Development Grants, Gallery presented another eco DIY Soap making workshop as well as, led by Indigenous artists, five Cultural Weaving workshops with Aunty Elaine Magias and two "Afternoon with Aunties" dot painting art sessions. Workshops are presented to community with the aim to contribute to a better cultural/eco practices understanding, learning and skills development as well as social interactions. Additionally, workshops provide employment for Indigenous persons and are introducing G1 programs to wider community, contributing to further involvement of project participants with Gallery One.

Gallery One exhibition program in 2021/22 included our regular, yearly exhibitions: SALA, G1 Students and Members EOY exhibition, Life@Death, and Unley High School Phoenix. We started 2021/22 year with the SALA exhibition themed "Movement In Plain Air" curated by Gerard Mignot which inspired artists to get out of their studios and try to capture the movement of light and colours. The second SALA 21 exhibition was a miniretrospective of our Committee Member Robert Zunic's artworks in the exhibition titled "Vignettes". The end of the year saw us presenting "Gallery One Students' and Members' exhibition" including the famous Gallery One Awards Night as well as "Phoenix"-Unley High School event that showcased young artists and musicians. Life@Death 2022 for its 10th Anniversary presented 22 artists' work on the theme of "Still Life". L@D 22 also featured a florist as an artist in residence. "Retrospective of a rich life" was a well-visited exhibition of a significant Adelaide art educator and artist Des Bettany and his children's, architect Graham Bettany and artist and art lecturer Ruth Flaherty, artworks.

We also showed: exhibitions by Spanish artist and flamenco singer Salvador Loreto; works of Penola Artist and John Shaw Neilson Acquisitive Award 2022 recipient Dagny Strand; Indigenous exhibition in collaboration with Glenelg Art Gallery; "Don't mention Pollock", an exhibition of abstract works by first-time exhibitor Stephen Jones and Jenny Gregson and Students mini-exhibition. in 2021/22 a lot of work and effort went into the inaugural Gallery One Smallacombe Portrait Prize. The subcommittee brainstormed on the prize concept and requirements which continued in writing, polishing, and rewriting the terms and conditions of the prize. Our website manager created the online registration form and developed accompanying communication pathways with artists and Gallery One. In December 2021 Prize was released. A huge amount of work went into locating and contacting various art organisations in SA and around Australia as well as educational institutions (for M&M Carbins Youth Prize). The prize was intensively promoted on our social media, through our newsletter and website.
